



	<p style="text-align: center;">Casual Day</p> <p>Students wear appropriate casual clothing, such as no uniform, hats, team t-shirts, for a day after making a donation (\$1-\$5)</p>	<p style="text-align: center;">Math-a-thon</p> <p>Have the children get pledges prior to taking an age appropriate 100 point math test. The pledges can be as little as a penny for every correct answer.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;">Bake Sale</p> <p>Have students volunteer to sell donated baked goods at a school function.</p>
<p style="text-align: center;">Administrative Make-over</p> <p>Students can organize a school-wide competition to raise money. The class with the most money is allowed to give a make over to the school's Administrator.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;">Wishing Well</p> <p>A penny collection for a certain amount of time is a great way to quickly raise money. Ask us about checking out a big jar of pennies from the hospital and allow students to guess how many pennies are in the jar before the program begins.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;">Parking Space Raffle</p> <p>Sell raffle tickets to students for the best parking space (which could be decorated/painted) for the month. Pick several winners so there is more incentive to donate.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;">Hoops for Kids</p> <p>See which grade level can shoot more hoops for the Kids. This is an activity that can be done during gym class or at an assembly. Have students pay \$1 to shoot baskets until they miss. The more they make, the more points they get for their grade. Prizes for the winning grade can be free homework passes, a pizza party, etc.</p>
<p style="text-align: center;">Penny Race</p> <p>Give each class or team a jar that is placed in a prominent place. Each penny placed in the team jar earns one point. Each nickel, dime, or quarter deducts 5, 10, 25 points respectively. The participants are allowed to put coins in any jar they wish, to deduct points from other teams' totals.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;">Student/Faculty Play-off</p> <p>Have students pay a fee to watch a game played between students and faculty (basketball, kickball, softball, etc.). Have those participating pay a small fee as well, all to be donated.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;">Concession Stand</p> <p>Have kids volunteer at a concession stand for a school sporting event. Have a portion of the proceeds go to the Wishing Well program.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;">Lawn Flamingos</p> <p>Have students donate money (the cost of a flamingo plus some) to have the principal's yard decorated for a weekend.</p>
<p style="text-align: center;">Dance for Kids</p> <p>Organize a theme dance and charge \$1 per person or add \$1 to the ticket price. The higher the attendance the more money you will raise.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;">Movie Night</p> <p>Host a movie night at your school on a big screen TV and charge per person. If you wanted to raise even more money, have a concession stand with popcorn and candy.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;">Homework Pass</p> <p>Have a class collect pennies and the participant who collects the most money gets a free homework pass to be used for any homework assignment.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;">Restaurant School Night</p> <p>Have schools partner with a local restaurant to designate part of a day where a portion of the profits go toward the school. Use these profits to donate to the Wishing Well program.</p>
<p style="text-align: center;">Spirit Day</p> <p>Encourage students to wear school spirit wear—including hats—for a \$1 donation.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;">Car Wash</p> <p>Pick a day where people can make donations instead of paying to have their car washed by the kids.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;">Foreign Currency</p> <p>Have students and faculty collect the foreign currency found around their house from past vacations.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;">Sports Game Raffle</p> <p>Sell raffle tickets to win 2 tickets to a local sports game.</p>
